
Sr. Kevin is among the first six pioneering Sisters chosen to leave St. Mary's Abbey for the Uganda Mission in December 1902.





### The First Burial

Interred at Mount Oliver, Dundalk, Ireland, Motherhouse of The Franciscan Missionary Sisters for Africa.

But the call soon came from Uganda

"Please send our Mother back"


"At Nkokonjeru Chapel "built literally by the hands of Mother Kevin" the remains lay in state all night"

The Pontifical Requiem Mass the following morning was a in a crowded chapel... Chiefs and people travelled distances over 400 miles to attend the ceremonies.

 $\dots$  all business was suspended, and the day was made a Day of mourning.

## The Second Burial

The Safair Line (Hunting Clan) brought the body to Entebbe. On arrival the magnificent preparations made by His Highness, the Kabaka, Ministers and Government, in conjunction with the Protectorate Government, and all under the guidance of Right Rev. V. Billington, Bishop of Kampala, were not long in taking effect. Over fifty of the County Chiefs, from the Protectorate, chiefly from Buganda sought permission ... to be Pall Bearers... It was touching to see the Prime Minister, himself the Minister of Justice and many others taking their turn in carrying the remains of her who had been to them a Mother as well as a Missionary.



After the Mass the funeral procession to the peaceful, beautiful convent cemetery took place through the grounds of the Convent where Mother Kevin had lovingly laboured for so many years, bananeries on one side, eucalyptus and cassia forests on the other, past the site where the first bricks were burnt from the old "White Hen" tree...
