

282 November 27 'Blessed Among Us

Servant of God Wanda Blenska Missionary Doctor (1911-2014)

(She worked with FMSA in Uganda at Leprosy Treatment Centre)

Born in Poznan, Poland, Wanda Blenska trained as a doctor, all the while dreaming of a missionary vocation. But when she applied to various mission societies, she was rejected. They were convinced, she later observed, that no solitary lay worker- "especially a woman" -could stand the arduous life. After earning her medical degree in 1934 she worked in a hospital in Torun. During the Nazi occupation she was active in the underground resistance and barely escaped death.

Following the war she pursued further studies in tropical medicine in Germany and England, waiting for the chance to pursue a mission to Africa. The opportunity came when she was invited to work in Uganda, at a leprosy treatment center run by an order of Franciscan sisters. After her arrival in 1951 and under her leadership, the facility expanded to St. Francis Hospital, which would remain her home for the next forty years.

Her chief work was the care of lepers. A pioneer in the treatment of Hanson's disease, she combined medical expertise with compassionate care, earning her the title "Mother of the Lepers:' Treating her patients with dignity, she began by offering each patient a handshake- "even for patients with hardly any hands left;' as one of her colleagues recalled.

Eventually she retired and turned over the work for other hands. She died on November 27, 2014, at the age of 103. Her cause for canonization is in process.

"What she saw in the lepers was not just the disease. She saw the entire human being, along with their fears and hopes, who deserved, apart from professional care, respect and tenderness."

New Beginnings in Zimbabwe,

Celebrating the new beginnings for St. John the Baptist High School.

The new mission is located in Odzi, a rural village located 45 kilometres North-West of Mutare off the Mutare -Harare highway with population of 10,704 (5,574 males and 5,130 females) 10.56% attend early education, 65.76% primary, 23.32% secondary and 0.35% tertiary level. Source of water is mostly boreholes & deep wells. Subsistence farming of maize & tobacco is seasonal, so families lack income. They get implements on loan & after repaying, there is little profit, so men do gold panning & road construction. Females engage in transactional sex. Anxiety and fear awaits the reopening of schools amid Covid 19 hence calls for an urgent need of adequate classrooms, staff houses near the school and improve water and sanitation.

Odzi rural lacks Primary & High School facilities. The nearest Primary is 1km away & high was 13km away. Poor education leads to high poverty & early marriages. The ground breaking ceremony held on the 4th of February 2022 was a momentous occasion that brought together all stakeholders interested in the upgrading and improving the quality of education for the primary and High school. It also brought joy to FMSA as they were officially handed over the school by the bishop. The thrust is to bring good news to the rural folks of Odzi and offer them the path to enjoy life to the fullest through various programmes including child protection and child rights awareness, sexual reproductive health education, gender based violence awareness and environmental awareness. On this day, the community of Odzi embraced the project and assured their support in making this dream a success of bringing the school nearer to the children.

"My Wish is Collaboration for Better Pastoral Work," An icon of hope; the new Catholic Bishop of Wau Diocese, Matthew Remijio Adam Gbitiku

Pope Francis on Wednesday November 18, appointed Fr. Matthew Remijio Adam Gbitiku, a member of the Comboni Missionaries of the Heart of Jesus (MCCJ) the new Bishop of South Sudan's Wau Diocese.

In an interview with AMECEA Online on Thursday, November 19, the Bishop-elect, by then, a native of South Sudan from Wau Diocese has appealed for collaboration to enhance pastoral work in the pastoral district.

"This appointment came as a surprise," the Bishop disclosed and narrated, "But I have taken it positively and it is my hope that we collaborate for better pastoral work in the diocese. Through mutual collaboration and understanding, a lot can be achieved."

He acknowledges that being familiar with the people of Wau, their language, their culture, and most of the priests in the diocese is an advantage as he begins the new mission. Wau Diocese has been vacant since 6 Mar 2017, after the death of Bishop Rudolf Deng who served for over 20 years but has been under the leadership of Archbishop Stephen Ameyu Martin Mulla who was appointed by its Apostolic Administrator in September 2020.

After the announcement of the appointment on November 16, the Comboni Missionaries Provincial Superior for Kenya Province Fr. Austine Radol in a message to his confreres asked them to pray for the Bishop Mathew Remigio, in his new mission saying, "We accompany him with our prayers in this new responsibility."



Nuns in Ukraine rescue, escort stranded foreign students to border

An Indian Catholic nun and her associates are working round-the-clock to help stranded students and others fleeing war-torn Ukraine. "God is using me to save people from death in Ukraine," said Sr. Ligi Payyappilly, the 48year-old superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Saint-Marc in Mukachevo, Ukraine. Payyappilly, who is Indian, and 17 sisters of her congregation are giving shelter and food to the distressed students, besides helping them cross the Ukrainian border to escape to countries including Hungary, Romania and Slovakia." Being in Ukraine for over 20 years, I have a lot of contacts and networks that helped me carry out this mission so far," Payyappilly told GSR by phone after midnight March 3, just before her scheduled two-hour sleep. Her convent in Mukachevo in western Ukraine is some 480 miles southwest of the national capital of Kiev.

People helped by Payyappilly's team profusely thanked the nuns.

"We never thought we would be alive now," said Vignesh Suresh, a third-year student of medicine who hails Payyappilly as "God's angel who came to help us when we were totally lost."

Speaking to GSR an route to Bucharest by train, Suresh said he and 45 other Indian students were stranded at the Polish border for 15 hours when Payyappilly and Sr. Christina Tymurzhina, a Ukrainian, came to help them. "The sisters took us to their convent in their vehicles, hugged each of us with their love and warmth, gave us food, a warm hall to sleep in and escorted us in the morning to cross the Romania border," Suresh said as his friends slept on the train.






Without Jesus,
